Once again, during the first week of school, staff members were visible in their orange vests, directing the student pedestrian traffic from the Montreal West train station. Note that there are three sets of commuter trains running through the Montreal West train station—assume that there may be more than one train coming through at a time. Remember to look both ways, cross the roads only at the crosswalks specified for students, stay alert, do not wear headphones, and practice safety first!

In addition, there are large numbers of students boarding the STM buses after school. It is important to



line up and board the bus in an orderly fashion, so that no one gets hurt. Also, parent drivers are reminded that the drop-off and pick-up of students takes place on **Easton Avenue ONLY!** Easton Avenue is the only safe drop-off area for students. Ainslie Street is now a No Stopping Zone. If you drop off your child on Ainslie, you risk receiving an \$85 ticket.

Our Secondary I Meet the Teacher evening was held on September 10. Parents were given short presentations by teachers from all subject domains. They also had an opportunity to hear from the administration, the Secondary I homeroom teachers, and our school guidance counsellor, Mr. Mateus, who discussed the sometimes difficult transition to high school, the pressure some students may feel at RWA, and the necessity for students to have some relaxing downtime! Parents were also encouraged to ensure that their child not have a cell phone or computer available during times of rest. Cell phones should not be used as alarm clocks. The distractions far outweigh the benefits.

RWA Home & School Association's next meeting will take place on October 21, 2014, at 7:30 PM. The Home & School provides much needed funds for pedagogical materials, special events, and building improvements. Most students have already begun participating in our extra-curricular activities program. We continue to make improvements to our facility. Thanks to the Home & School, 314 new lockers were installed in the West Wing of the school. Over 50 years of rust and deterioration were replaced by beautiful and functional lockers that meet our students' needs. This \$50,000 investment was made possible through the generosity of our Home & School and the EMSB. Special thanks to our Deputy Director General, Ms. P. Miniaci, for her continued support of Royal West Academy.

Royal West Academy was also awarded a \$10,000 grant under the School Yard Beautification Program of the ministère de l'Éducation, du Loisir, et du Sport. The Ministry and the EMSB both matched \$5,000 investments made by RWA toward the landscaping of our Park N' Lot project. The announcement was made at the Start of Year Celebration by Ms. Kathleen Weil, MNA and Minister of Immigration, Diversity, and Inclusiveness. The Park N' Lot project is in its third year and continues to be a great example of school and community cooperation. Keep your eyes and ears open for this year's Harvest Party—coming soon to a garden near you!

The Royal West Academy staff would like to thank Mr. and Mrs. Goldstein for their generous donation of furniture for the school's staff lounge. On many evenings the staff lounge also doubles as a conference room for many parent groups including the RWA Home & School, RWA Foundation, and the Bardolator Parents Association. 

## **Germany Exchange**

Royal West Academy just wrapped up its latest International Student Exchange. Along with present faculty member Mr. A. Vamvakas, and retired faculty members Mrs. S. Westlake, Mr. D. Floen, and Mr. A. Scrivener, 22 Secondary III students traveled to the Hesse, Rhineland-Palatinate, Saarland, Baden-Württemberg, and Bavaria regions of Germany with stops in France, Austria, and Switzerland interspersed along the way, from September 5 to 21.

In the process the students and staff experienced, among others; hiking in the Alps above the clouds (Oberstdorf), visiting King Ludwig II's fairy tale castles at Neuschwanstein Castle and Linderhof Palace, medieval cities such as Strasbourg (France), Heidelberg, Riquewihr, Oberammergau and Regensberg, visiting a 600-year-old functioning salt



mine near Salzburg (Austria), and taking in the sites of this picturesque city and its fortified palace, and a night watchman tour of Munich as well as biking through the English Garden in Munich, the spectacular Deutches Museum and two river cruises along the Rhine and Danube Rivers.

The students and staff stayed with German families of students and staff who had visited Canada a year ago, in Fürstenfeldbruck, Bavaria, for nine days, and experienced German and Bavarian life firsthand. The town is approximately 30 km from Munich, one of Germany's most exciting and vibrant cities.

The entire Canadian entourage was received with a rousing heartfelt reception when they arrived, attended by all the German families and dignitaries from the region and school.

Over the next few days some of the students even took in a FC Bayern München game against VfB Stuttgart while others enjoyed hockey games, museum visits, visiting the Olympiastadion, the BMW Museum and BMW World.

Not all of the trip was solely for entertainment and fun. The visit to the Dachau Concentration Camp was a solemn and moving tour of a site so sacred to human history. Several of the students and staff were overcome with emotions, as four hours were spent walking the paths of those who had been imprisoned, suffered, and died during those dreadful times so long ago. It must be noted that the German state preserved the camp to reflect its wartime condition, so that present and future generations of visitors can have a poignant experience.

Another day was taken up by a visit to the Max Wimmer Bäckerei und Konditorei, where the students enjoyed a lesson in the German/Bavarian art of pretzel making. The students and staff made mounds and mounds of pretzels, which they later had delivered to them to enjoy with their host families.

The culmination of the exchange was visiting the start of the Oktoberfest in Munich, an annual event that attracts over 6.5 million visitors to the city.

As the students and staff bid farewell on the last day, many tears were shed for the great friendships forged with our German hosts and their families from the Graf-Rasso-Gymnasium Fürstenfeldbruck, with the promise that we would meet again "wiedersehen."

## Our Trip To Germany

The first day of group activities was on Monday. We went to the Berchtesgaden Salt Mines. There we had fun on the rollercoaster and slides. That afternoon we went to the surprise water garden where many of us got wet. The next stop was the Hellabrunn castle where we had a tour, then free time.

On Tuesday, the Canadian students visited the Dachau concentration camp. This was an emotional outing that really made us understand the Second World War. One of the highlights of the trip happened that afternoon with Mike's Bike Tours, where we had to venture out on rented bikes across Munich.

Wednesday morning we baked pretzels at a Bäckerei (bakery). Later, we attended our billets' class which was very different for many of us. The evening was spent again in Munich, but this time for a night tour.

Thursday was spent in Regensberg, where we had a guided tour and then later a boat ride through the Danube Gorge.

Friday morning was spent at the Deutsches Museum. This tour was not only educational but also interesting. We had a little bit of free time for shopping and buying lunch before we went to our homes. That evening we had a youth party at a beach house—sadly it was raining so we couldn't go outside but it was still fun.

Saturday was the first day of Oktoberfest, so everyone went. Oktoberfest was so much fun. That evening there was a get together at one of the Germans' houses. It was a shame that not everyone was there.
