Special thanks to all the staff that has been committed to this process, including Ms. P. Taylor who makes all our visitors feel welcome and Mr. J. Mateus, Ms. M. Wineberg, and Ms. S. Di Pietro for administering the qualifying exams. Congratulations to Secondary V students Nitesh Agarwal, Tanya Chen, Noah Cohen, Nicholas Koziris, Karina Paliotti, and Adam Wiltzer. The **Hospital Opportunity Program for Students** provides an opportunity for students to observe and assist medical personnel within a large hospital setting. The Auxiliary of the Jewish General Hospital has arranged for these students to spend half a day per week for two 5-week periods in various departments of the hospital.

Once again this year, the **Secondary II students** embarked on a fundraising campaign for the Terry Fox Foundation. Students worked tirelessly to raise \$10,399. Congratulations to the Secondary II class and thank you to Mrs. M.-C. O'Neil, Mr. J. Monachino, and Mr. F. Martin.

A great end to the hockey raffle and gala

Parents, students, teachers, and staff managed to sell 1611 tickets for the hockey raffle, raising \$63,320 in revenues and generating over \$41,000 in profits. It is the largest single fundraiser that the Royal West Academy Foundation has ever held.

The 30th anniversary gala was also a success, attracting over 200 parents. The Bardolators, Honour Band, Jazz Band, and actors from the annual musical all performed to everyone's delight. Alyssia Baynes-Barnes, anchor of the late night news on Global TV and an RWA grad, was the special host of the gala—and she did a really great job.

The evening raised over \$4000 and produced \$2000 in profits toward the renovation of the auditorium. Foundation members and volunteer parents (Ginger Swift, Lindsay McLeod, Erica Brown, and Jasmin Uhthoff) coordinated all the work. More than one parent was heard saying that the gala volunteers had actually made the auditorium look attractive for once, a stark contrast to the worn out and sad appearance we're all so used to.

The funds raised, together with donations from parents and receipts from events held last year, are enough to begin the renovation of the auditorium. First up are new sound and lighting systems.

The Foundation's building and architecture committee (parent volunteers and seasoned construction veterans Paul Broomberg and Emilio Travisano) worked with parent John Davis (Stage Manager at Oscar Peterson Hall for the last 20 years) to set the specifications for new lights, speakers, and a mixing board. At the beginning of the school year, they went out for tender with the specifications and the Foundation has received five bids, all from highly qualified companies. Once the EMSB, the project architects, and the structural engineers have approved the new equipment and the auditorium's ability to support it, a winning bid will be chosen and a contract signed.

The desperately-needed new systems will cost around \$80,000 plus taxes and include 10 or more new speakers over the stage, sub-woofers on or in front of the stage, over 30 completely adjustable professional theatre lights, and a new mixing board capable of handling two to three dozen inputs simultaneously.

According to Davis, the equipment at RWA will be stateof-the-art and as good as what is available at Oscar Peterson Hall.

Ginette Purdy, Honour Band director and RWA music teacher, is very excited by the news. Her biggest pleasure comes from learning that for the first time since she has worked at RWA, the students in Honour Band will actually be able to clearly see the scores they are playing when they are on stage.

The Foundation is now planning a new fundraising campaign, probably for the spring, to keep the momentum going for the renovations. While the new light and sound systems are a big step forward, there is a tremendous amount of work still to do to improve our auditorium.
