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


I am grateful to have been selected for this program. I am looking forward to the next leg of the experience in Bavaria and I thank all those making this possible.

Light The Night Walk

"Cancer"

Was "Death" the first word you thought about? The Leukemia and Lymphoma Society of Canada is trying to

change your mind. They are trying to help patients survive their battle with blood cancer. They want the word "Survival" to pop into your mind when you hear the word "Cancer". The Light The Night Walk is how all of us can make a difference.

The Light The Night Walk is a annual event where communities, corporations, teams, and friends and family across Canada help raise awareness and funds for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society of Canada (LLSC). The walk takes place in many large cities across Canada, including Montreal, Quebec City, Vancouver, and Victoria. The goal of this yearly project is to raise funds for blood cancer research, free educational materials and events for patients and their families, local programs such as Family Support Groups, and assistance through the LLSC's Information Resource Centre. The Light The Night Walk helps the community by raising awareness for Leukemia and Lymphoma, and gives ways to help the tragedies families go through when a loved one is diagnosed.

This year, the Light The Night Walk was held on October 19 at Parc Jean-Drapeau. The event started around 5:30 PM and ended around 9:30 PM. Before the walk, there was food and drink from Domino's Pizza and Van Houtte, two of the Walk's sponsors. When everyone was settled in, there was a performance by Young Avz. The people who attended this event started walking the five kilometres at around 7:30 PM and walked for about two hours through Parc Jean-Drapeau.

Light The Night is open to all people who wish to participate and raise awareness for blood cancer. There are thousands of people who walk in this event. They include survivors (who carry white lanterns), people who walk for lost loved ones (gold lanterns), and supporters who have not been affected by Leukemia or Lymphoma (red lanterns).



Light The Night is also an event for survivors to show that battling and fighting cancer is possible. There are tents that represent different teams, each with their own survivors. Each team has a certain amount of people, and together they raise money for the LLSC to save more battling patients. During the walk, there was a section called the

Walk of Silence, where bags containing candles and names of lost ones are placed along the path to commemorate and remember those who did not win their battle.

This year, Montreal raised over \$1 million for the LLSC, which is all going toward treatments and research for blood cancer. Many companies like Tommy Hilfiger contributed and donated over \$10,000 for Light The Night. Schools in Montreal, Laval, and surroundings all raised money for this event, including Royal West Academy, who raised about \$2200.

This walk helps bring people together and makes us realize that there really is hope. Finding a cure may be tough, but it isn't impossible. Facing the world may be tough, but it isn't impossible. Battling cancer may be tough, but it most certainly is not impossible.
