The Governing Board held its regular meeting on January 11 at 7 PM in the school library.

At the meeting, it was reported by the alternate parent delegate that the EMSB is planning to implement Mosaïk (GRICS portal) for all its schools. Although this portal is supposed to replace all others that are currently used by some schools, our school administration had not yet received a written directive from the Board. As it stands, RWA is using the free version of Schoology. More information will be shared with you as it becomes available.

The principal presented the annual school budget for 2017–2018 and the Board members discussed the budget items in detail. Members were advised of the amount allocated by the EMSB as per the MEES Mesures 2017–2018 and were asked to verify the calculations associated with this amount in the budget.

The annual EMSB Volunteer Appreciation Night is scheduled for April 17, 2018. The Board invites the people who have volunteered at EMSB schools for five years or more to this annual gala. The five years duration is cumulative and includes years that were spent volunteering at elementary and high school levels at EMSB schools.

The minutes of our Governing Board meetings are posted on the RWA website after their approval at the subsequent Board meeting. Our next meeting is scheduled for March 19, 2018, at 7 pm in the school library. Our meetings are open to all RWA stakeholders.
