- Merchandise Coordination: help identify items that our community would like to purchase (we already sell mugs, tuques, bags, and several other items), find a distributor, and start selling them (via the website or at school events).
- **Donor Relations**: track donations (financial or in kind) and ensure that tax receipts, etc. are distributed as appropriate. Ensure the list of

donors on the website and school display screens are kept up-to-date.

RWA Grads Share Their CEGEP Experience



In less than two months, CEGEP applications open to Secondary V students all over Quebec. This process can appear daunting to many students, as they figure out



what programs particularly interest them and what school will work best for them. Having my own questions and concerns about the CEGEP experience and how our teachers here at Royal West Academy prepare us for the future, I decided to interview two RWA grads of 2018 to find out their views on the matter.

Angela Nelson and Alia Dobson eagerly shared their experiences and thoughts with me on transitioning from high school to CEGEP. They both attend Dawson College and are respectively in the Health Science and Liberal Arts programs. They are also both on the Division 2 Dawson Blues women's volleyball team, shown wearing their uniforms in the pictures below.



When I asked the grads about their feelings going into CEGEP, the response was pretty unanimous. "A new school seemed really scary to me, especially having been at Royal West Academy for five years and building such an amazing community there," said Alia. Angela responded emphatically, saying "I was extremely nervous!"—a feeling echoed by many Secondary V students.

I then asked, "In what ways has RWA prepared you for CEGEP and made the transition easier?". Angela responded saying, "I feel like I was a lot less shocked about the CEGEP workload coming from RWA, and adjusted better than many of my peers." Alia added, "Because we came from Royal West Academy, having been surrounded by high achieving students, we became more high achieving ourselves. The advanced classes we took also prepared us for the possibility of failure, which is inevitable in life, but they also taught us how to overcome failure and to work hard." The final question I asked the girls was about the advice they would give to Secondary V students going through the same process they went through a year ago. Angela responded saying, "You should go into something you like and follow your heart!" Alia agreed, saying, "Pick something that you are interested in, but challenge yourself as well. Factor your strengths into the decision but don't restrict yourself."

As the Secondary V students of Royal West Academy prepare to apply to CEGEP, the advice and experience of these two students is invaluable and should definitely be taken into account when making the big decision!

Spanish Trip: Costa Rica

On February 27–March 7, 2019, Royal

West Academy is offering a Costa Rica trip to its Secondary IV and V students. Although this trip is meant primarily for students who are currently in or who have already taken a Spanish class, all who are interested are permitted to sign up as well. To date, 34 students have registered for the trip.

Faculty member and teacher Mr. Wilson, alongside the administration, has spent a great deal of time organizing and preparing for the March Break trip. He has spent time researching and has referred back to past backpacking experiences in Central America in order to create the itinerary. This was all done to get a sense of which tourist attractions would be the most suitable for students. In an interview, he stated that Costa Rica has "all of the natural beauty and biodiversity, if not more, compared to other Central American countries."

Some of the everyday activities that will take place on the trip include: visiting a hot spring and a coffee and chocolate plantation, hiking to Arenal's hanging bridges, spending time at the beach in Playa Samara, and going snorkelling and sea kayaking. Students will also have the option to go on a canopy tour in Monteverde and to either go horseback riding in the mountains or take a surfing class.

The trip will not only be an outdoor adventure for RWA students, but an educational experience as well. Mr. Wilson says, "The best way to learn a new language



is to be immersed inside a country that speaks the language and to be exposed to it." This is exactly what the trip offers. Students will be going into stores, and will hopefully be able to negotiate prices for themselves as well. In addition, they will be visiting a primary school and be able to converse with the Spanish speaking children. All in all, RWA students will obtain an incredible immersion experience in a foreign country.

At present, three additional RWA staff members, Ms. Tannous, Ms. Belina, and Ms. Reddy, will also be coming along on the trip. Ms. Tannous is RWA's newest vice-principal and this will be an opportunity for her to get to know some of the students at the school. Ms. Belina has lots of experience dealing with international trips, can speak a little bit of Spanish, and is trained in CPR. Ms. Reddy, on the other hand, is very keen to go on the trip because she hasn't been on an RWA school trip since she started teaching here last year. She also wants to see the beautiful nature that Costa Rica holds—particularly the monkeys!

As a whole, all of the participants going on the trip are extremely excited for this great opportunity.
