
During the long weekend of February 12–14, while most people were at home relaxing, the Royal West Academy Robotics Club was at the 2015 CRC competition with 30 other schools.

The robot we built used a conveyer belt to pick up the balls and a scissor lift to bring them up to the

Breast Cancer Committee

Breast cancer is sadly one of the most common and horrible diseases there are these days in Canada. Believe it or not, the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation estimated that in 2014 alone, around 24,000 women and 210 men would be diagnosed with breast cancer. It was also estimated that 5000 women and 60 men would die from this disease.

The breast cancer mortality rate peaked in 1986, but thankfully since then it has been decreasing. Specialized advancements in technology are what have been helping this decreasing mortality rate. These advancements are all thanks to the great fundraising that people do for this cause.

At the beginning of the 2014–2015 school year, two Royal West Academy students, Miranda Lalla (Secondary III) and Jayme Rothstein (Secondary IV), wanted to help make a change. These girls started up the Breast Cancer Committee here at RWA.



The RWA Breast Cancer Committee is made up of approximately 35 students from Secondary III and IV, who attend multiple meetings every month to discuss the progress and upcoming events of the committee.

So far this year, this committee has organized multiple events, including Candy Grams (on Halloween); a raffle sponsored by MAC Cosmetics, Starbucks, and DAVIDsTEA; and Menchie's Frozen Yogurt. The committee has already raised approximately \$1000, with all of its funds going to the Cedars Cancer Institute.

The Committee is now in the process of planning its biggest event yet at RWA: the Breast Cancer Committee's show, "I Am Strong". This event will take

place on April 2, 2015, at 7 PM, at Royal West Academy. It will include the performances of 32 RWA students, a raffle, a bake sale, refreshments, and a bracelet sale.

The whole committee hopes that this event will be a great success and wishes that as many people as possible will come out and show their support for this great cause!

The Governing Board Report

This will be a short report this month though a lot has been going on at Governing Board.

At its previous meeting held in January, the Governing Board decided on a new format for the minutes of each meeting that involved a good deal of detail about the discussions that took place on each issue before a final vote was taken. The intent was to provide a better record of the meetings so that parents, teachers, and students, would better understand the Board's positions.

In the meeting of February 11, the Board revisited its decision and decided, now that it was looking at the detailed minutes of the January meeting that ran to ten pages, to revert to the old format of having only the motions and the votes recorded. Key concerns were that Board members taking unpopular positions might be stigmatized and that the longer form of the minutes did not conform to the sample format provided by the EMSB. The discussion will likely be taken up again in the future.

If you have an opinion on whether minutes should be short and to the point, or detailed enough that non-Board members can understand the workings of the Board, please let me know at kirkkelly@sympatico.ca.

The subcommittee created to examine the possibility of setting up a portal for Royal West Academy presented a progress report. A number of possible solutions have been examined and some preliminary testing was done. Mr. Pita suggested that the subcommittee work closely with the Director of IT for the EMSB as he is also studying the issue of a portal solution for all EMSB schools. The committee agreed.

The subcommittee then proposed a roadmap for the next three months, with the goal of having a concrete

recommendation for the Board by the end of this academic year. Some of the key steps include:

- Establish a governance framework for the project. Identify key stakeholders in each of the user communities: sponsor, teaching staff, administrative staff, students, parents, and EMSB.
- ii) Establish first draft of functional and nonfunctional requirements for the solution.
- iii) Determine which solutions to consider.
- iv) Organize live demonstrations of the viable solutions. Update requirements based on what was learned from the demos.
- v) Finalize selection criteria and weighting.
- vi) Independent testing by the stakeholders.
 Establish a mechanism for collecting
 stakeholder feedback. Collect and consolidate
 feedback from stakeholders.
- vii) Analyze the results.
- viii) Prepare a formal recommendation:
 - 1) Ideal technical solution
 - 2) Implementation/training recommendations
 - 3) New roles/responsibilities (e.g., teacher support, parent support, etc.)
- ix) Table subcommittee final report at the May 2015 Governing Board meeting.

Efforts to set up a life skills course for students in Secondary V continue. Some preliminary discussions have been held in the Contemporary World area to assess the practicality of setting aside four to eight classes for Life Skills. One key advantage of having the Life Skills material in the Contemporary World course is that the course is mandatory for all Secondary V students. Not all teachers have had a chance to weigh in yet so the discussions are ongoing.

The review of the trip policy requested by the Board is also progressing. Ms. Purdy has summarized the key issues that need to be addressed and the Staff Council has begun to discuss them. Once the Council has recommendations, they will be sent to the Board for discussion.

Every year, the Board is required to prepare a document that sets out the criteria for the selection of a principal at Royal West Academy. This document is used by the EMSB whenever it is necessary to appoint a new principal. If you think of it as an insurance policy, you would be on the right track. The document only

exists in case it is needed, not because the Board intends to switch principals at RWA every year.

Finally, the Board began to work on the Budget Building Process for next year's budget for the school board. Each year, the Ministry sets goals for the school networks, touching on things like academic achievement, retention, safety and security, professional development, etc. The school board in turn consults with the schools to determine the best ways for the whole school network to achieve those goals, given the material and budget constraints in effect.

In the not too distant past, schools were asked what it was that the Board should do with additional resources: more librarians, more books, fix buildings, etc. For the last few years, schools are asked what it is that they are currently doing that they do not want to see cut. Each school is limited to five choices. The Board assumes that you might, grudgingly, accept cuts to whatever activities you don't list.

The tentative priority list for Royal West Academy for the 2015–2016 budget year follows:

- Frontline support for students through adequate student services staff, guidance counselors, and addiction counselors;
- IT technical support including support for a student-parent-teacher portal and ensuring the effective functioning of both hardware and software;
- Pedagogical technology support to assist teachers with content creation and integration of the available technology tools into pedagogy;
- Devolve professional development budgets to Royal West Academy to ensure training is appropriate to our special programs and the needs of our teachers;
- 5) Fully fund pedagogical support materials.

The Board is soliciting feedback on the priority list from students and teachers, and intends to return to the discussion of budget priorities in its next meeting.



LOST AND FOUND POLICY


