December 10 marked our second annual Hackathon event (see page 7 for details). Students from Royal West Academy, Vincent Massey Collegiate, and Merton Elementary School participated in a day of programming code. Thank you to Mr. S. Nemeth, Mr. C. Northey, Mr. A. Vamvakas, and Mme L. Bourdeau for organizing the event.

Our return to school in January has also been quite a busy one. During the week of January 23–27, RWA students wrote various supplemental exams in subjects such as Math, Histoire, and Science and Technology. All Secondary V students wrote the Français langue seconde exams. We are proud of how hard our students prepared for these exams. As well, during the week of January 30–February 3, 2017, RWA students will be writing their mid-year examinations. Students are working very hard to prepare for their exams.

On January 17, RWA staff and students participated in our annual Winter Carnival Day. Participation in this year's event was the highest in recent memory. The event involved some great activities such as skiing, snowboarding, hockey, tubing, cabane à sucre (see

page 8 for details), and the opportunity to enjoy some in-school activities. Students and staff enjoyed the good weather conditions and reported having a great time. Special thanks to the SLA (led by Mr. J. Zigby) for their efforts in organizing this event.

On January 26, RWA hosted its third Secondary I Parent Seminar of the school year. The theme of this seminar was how to help your child manage stressful situations. Our Student Services team discussed a variety of strategies that parents can utilize to help their child cope with the various stressors that occur in a high school setting. This seminar was especially relevant given that our Secondary I students wrote mid-year examinations for the first time. Many thanks go to Mr. J. Mateus and Ms. C. Almeida for the hard work they put into creating this seminar.

Royal West Academy will be holding some upcoming Grade Level trips. On February 7–10, 2017, Secondary V students will be participating in the annual New York City Trip, and our Secondary II students will have the opportunity to participate in the annual Stoneham Ski Trip.

On February 23, 2017, RWA will host its annual Science Fair (see page 4 for details). Approximately 400 students participate in our annual fair, while many others will volunteer their services. Parents are reminded that only those students participating in the Science Fair are expected to attend school that day. Parents and students are free to visit the fair during the school day or the evening session.

Students and parents have already received the 2017–2018 Course Selection forms. This document serves as your child's registration form for next year. Students presently in Secondary I are required to select their Arts course despite not yet having completed their three rotations of Music, Visual Arts, and Drama. Students may revise their choice for elective courses later in the year. Any student, at any level, can change selections any time between January and June by forwarding to the Administration a letter signed by a parent. Placement in an elective of your choice is contingent on number of students enrolled, marks, and prerequisites. If you are concerned about your child's placement in Math or French, we encourage you to

meet with your child's teacher at the upcoming Parent-Teacher Evening on March 16, 2017. If your child is not returning to Royal West Academy, please send a letter to that effect as soon as possible.

Finally, we know Montreal can be faced with some harsh weather conditions that sometimes cause delays in getting to school. We request that students and parents plan for these possible delays during the winter months. Student tardiness is extremely disruptive, and it stifles the learning process. We ask that parents and students make every effort to minimize late arrivals. Parents should still call the school or send a note if they expect their child to arrive late. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.



November 30 was a day to remember for Royal West Academy students and staff. We were honoured to hold a memorial ceremony to commemorate a former RWA student who was the victim of a drunk driving crash.

The ceremony was held by Mothers Against Drunk Driving. MADD is a charitable organization that brings awareness to the issue of impaired driving, with the hope of bringing an end to it. The ceremony was filled with touching moments as we received speeches from various individuals.



Firstly, the president of MADD Montreal, Debby Coveny, spoke to us about the organization itself. This gave the students and staff insight into what the charity is all about.

We were then privileged to listen to Kiki Souranis, mother of the former RWA student, and victim herself. She explained to the audience that the ones who are in the car at the time of the crash are not the only victims in the situation. Everyone around the person—family, friends—they are all victims themselves as they must face the grief of losing a person they love.

Finally, the victim's best friend who was in the car himself, bravely recounted the deadly crash. This included the events leading up to and those that followed. Tears welled up in the eyes of many when it was heard that he held his best friend's head in his lap before passing. A horror story for many became his reality that he will have to live with for the rest of his life.

As the ceremony came to an end, a select few made their way to the school foyer where a memorial bench was to be unveiled. This bench was a kind donation from MADD and it was surrounded by two bare trees waiting to be wrapped in red ribbons. Every student in the school would then be given a red ribbon in the following weeks to place on one of the trees and participate in this meaningful ceremony.



Mackay Centre Volunteering




The Mackay Centre School is a school for deaf and disabled children in Notre-Dame-de-Grâce. It is an elementary school, with a senior class for students up to 16 or 17 years old. Because of its nature, the Mackay Centre does not function exactly as other public schools, and extra help is often required. Which is why Royal West Academy sends some of their students each year to help some of the teachers. This year I was fortunate enough to be one of them.

Volunteering at the Mackay Centre consists of helping out a teacher with whatever they might need. This can range from helping the students read or write, to printing or filling out various forms and paperwork.

I was a volunteer every Monday morning for a period of ten weeks. Going into it, all I knew was that the Mackay Centre was a school for disabled children, but I had no idea what the kids would be like or how the school actually functioned. Immediately it was clear that all the teachers and staff were extremely kind, and cared a lot about the kids and their development. The students were also very sweet and almost always smiling.

During my time volunteering I was in a kindergarten class of 11 students, which I learned is actually guite large compared to other years. The students were all amazing, and though at times some of them might act up or misbehave, they all had their hearts in the right place. Volunteering for the ten weeks was amazing because I got to see the students grow and develop. In only a few weeks I watched a student go from barely being able to write his own name (needing boxes for each letter and a lot of prompting) to being able to write it clearly and easily. I watched the students learn to count, colour, write, and draw shapes. Meanwhile I learned all sorts of things about them, getting to know them as people.

Volunteering at the Mackay Centre also helped me gain incredible respect for the teachers and staff at this school. The teacher I was with knew each student inside and out, being able to tailor work to each one of them. Just walking around the hall I saw different teachers interacting with different students, and was in awe of how well everyone was able to handle any situation.





In the end I learned a lot from this experience. I learned about how to interact with and handle kids with various disabilities, but I also learned that almost none of these kids are very different than the ones at my own school. Although some of them have a harder time with certain things—be it interacting with other kids or learning new concepts—or might have a physical handicap, they still act like any other kid I have ever met. This experience helped me realize that people with disabilities are a very important part of our community, and I personally think everyone should have an experience like this.

Though I was sad to leave the Mackay Centre, I will never forget the kids I met and what they taught me, and I will always keep the card they made for me.

Marc Hall sent a very strong message that if we stand up for what we believe in and what we think is right, there is nothing we cannot accomplish. He described his prom night as going exactly how he had ever dreamed of it being.

Pamphlets of the musical *Prom Queen* were then distributed to all members of the audience. The musical was playing at the Segal Centre for Performing Arts. Marc explained the premise of the musical and how it was based on his prom story.
