Senior Robotics Competition

On February 16–18, the Royal West Academy Senior Robotics Team attended the CRC Loops 2017 robotics competition. The CRC competition is an intense competition where CEGEPs and high schools from all over Montreal come to compete against each other. To compete in the competition, each school is expected to select a theme. From that theme, they must build a robot to compete in the main competition. This year, robots needed to gather and launch spools in order to gain points. Schools were placed into teams of two to compete against another team. The teams would start at the opposite ends of a playing field. Robots would collect spools out of a dispenser and throw them either under or over a wall located at the centre of the field. Teams earned points based on where the spools landed as well as each spool collected.

Each school also had the option to compete in several other challenges such as a kiosk competition, a website competition, a programming competition, and a video competition. The overall winner was then determined using a calculation of rankings from all the different competitions.

Our robotics team worked very hard all year to prepare for this event. Earlier on in the year, we had chosen our theme to be Tetris. We would meet every Wednesday after school for two hours in order to prepare for the competition. As we neared the competition, we would often meet up on weekends to add finishing touches to our robot.

The competition took place at Vanier College. The morning of the first day, we met up with the kiosk crew in order to set up our kiosk—a large wooden structure where we set up our tools. Our kiosk also boasted a small bar and a game of Tetris projected on a wall (a shout-out to Marianopolis College for their Tetris high score of 680,000).







Our robot was a flat, wooden, two-storey structure designed to grab spools with a claw and then either roll or hit them towards the other side of the field. Before the first matches, we worked hard to test and perfect our robot. After each match, we would fix our robot and try to improve it for the next match. We also competed in the kiosk and programming competition.

Our robot performed admirably in the competition, ranking 14th in the main competition. We also won first place in the Division 2 programming competition, earning us a place on the podium and a commemorative plaque.

Overall, I really enjoyed the experience. I found the competition to be an exciting and interactive experience. Though it was quite challenging, I enjoyed every moment of it and I cannot wait for next year.
