#### Age 13+

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# Addressing Race and Racism Resources and Tips for Teachers and Parents

For teachers and parents, initiating a conversation about race, racism, and racial injustice can be scary. You want to say the right thing, and you're worried about making a mistake. You want to be honest, and you also want to protect your children and students. Luckily, there are so many incredible resources available to help guide us; in the past weeks we've seen dozens of book lists, articles, videos and more circulating to help deepen our own learning and get the conversation started with our children. Below you will find a curated list of many of these resources. In the meantime, here are some key takeaways:

#### TALK

It is critical that we talk with children about race and racism, openly and honestly. It can't wait. Some families don't have the privilege of whether or not to have this conversation. There are age-appropriate ways to introduce the topic and build a foundation for future conversations from infancy onward. This is not a one-time conversation, it is an ongoing dialogue.

#### WALK

It is equally important that we, as educators and parents, walk the walk. We all know that children pick up on what we do more than what we say. Do the work yourself. It is not enough to be "not racist," we need to be antiracist. Do the work of challenging racism and other forms of injustice.

Commit to taking action.

#### LISTEN

Listen to your children. Let them lead the conversation with their thoughts and questions. Hold space even when you don't have the answers. Ask them what they want to know and what they need from you. Allow all questions. Allow all feelings. Get their ideas about what we can do.

#### LEARN

Learn about the history of racism and racial oppression. Educate yourself about your own biases. Build up your vocabulary so you can use direct and accurate language. Learn alongside your children.
