Give a brief summary explaining why you chose this headline and issue/event. Include the page number(s) that reference the issue/event that you are describing. Be sure that you have evidence to justify your reporting!

3. What is a moment in the novel in which a major character undergoes a transformation? This transformation can be in relation to their identity, worldview, or relationships with others. Explain the cause and effect of this change and provide the page number(s) for reference. Will this character remain changed? What are the pressures they are under to revert to their former self? What motivates them to maintain their new identity?

4. Imagine that a major character from your novel gets to make 3 wishes. What would they wish for? Be sure to consider what motivations lie behind their wish, and what conflict this wish would help them resolve.
