

The robin's song, BIXI bike sightings, and crater-sized potholes—all signs that spring has (finally!) sprung in Montreal. This also means that the end of the school year is fast approaching. We hope students are starting to think about cleaning out lockers, book returns, and exams.

#### Last Day of Classes

The last full day of classes is June 2, 2022 for Secondary I to IV students. June 1, 2022 is the last day of classes for Secondary V students. June 3, 2022 is a pedagogical day at Royal West Academy. Students are required to wear their proper school uniform until May 27, 2022, after which they may wear their physical education uniform. Otherwise, they are expected to wear their regular uniform along with their shoes.

#### Locker Clean Up

Students are encouraged to start thinking about gradual locker clean up. Lockers must be completely emptied by 8:40 AM on June 2, 2022. At this time, locks must be returned to homeroom teachers to avoid a fee. On June 3, 2022, any locks remaining on lockers will be cut and Royal West Academy will not be responsible for items left in lockers.

## Secondary V EMSB Accounts

Please be advised that Secondary V students will lose access to their EMSB account after graduation. Only students with active registrations maintain their access. Make sure to save any files/work you wish to keep **before June 30, 2022**.

#### Vacation Plans and Summer School

A reminder to parents to avoid scheduling appointments or summer vacations until they have seen the final exam schedule and they are certain their child will not need to attend summer school (July 2022) or need to write supplemental exams (July 19–August 2, 2022). If your child is experiencing difficulties, we encourage you to communicate with their teachers.

Our much-anticipated auditorium renovations are about to begin! In the next month, contractors will start renovations in our auditorium and music room (old girls' gym). We will thus be moving our music classes from these spaces to allow the magic to happen. Your child's music teacher will provide your child with details. Please be assured that construction work and class displacements will respect all mandated health and safety measures.

#### Road Safety and Impaired Driving

This year, all Secondary V students received a presentation called "Is the Thrill Worth It" by trauma experts from the Montreal Children's Hospital. The presentation consisted of road safety and the risks of impaired driving among teenagers. The presentation concluded with a testimonial entitled "Craig's Story" told through the voice of his mother. She shared the tragic loss of her son as a result of impaired driving and reflected on the life-long impact it has had on his family, friends, and community.

#### Social Justice for Ukraine



So when Russia began a military invasion of Ukraine on February 24, launching attacks on several cities, the Social Justice Club began developing a campaign to raise money in solidarity with the Ukrainian people. In exchange for a \$1 donation, students will receive a button that they are permitted to wear to show their support. Students also had the opportunity to bring in their own designs to create a custom button. In our first week of sales, the Social Justice Club raised over \$200—that's more than 200 buttons! All money raised will be donated to the Canadian Red Cross to help the humanitarian efforts in Ukraine.
