Robert Alfred Peck Prize for Excellence in French

Robert Alfred Peck was an employee of the former Protestant Board of Great Montreal. He served as a Teacher, Department Head, Superintendent of French and was a Vice-Principal at Riverdale High School before retiring in 1970. Mr. Peck co-authored the textbook for the teaching of French as a second language called "Le Francais pratique" which was mainstay in Protestant schools in Quebec for over 20 years. He is described by a long-time educator as "one of the best French teachers they have ever known". At the request of Mr. Peck's family, an award was created in his name. Mr. Peck was in attendance December 2002 when the prize was first awarded. Mr. Peck passed away in 2006 at the age of 92. The award continues to be given out annually to a graduating student or students of the EMSB who achieve the highest mark in French Secondary Language.

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



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An Afternoon at the Movies

Royal West Academy students learn about resilience and community through a film about the Vietnamese-Canadian experience. In December, the two Secondary V classes of Français Langue D'enseignement went on a unique school outing to the Cinéma Beaubien. The students, accompanied by French teachers Mme L. Moreau and Mme S. Ferland, attended a screening of the movie Ru, adapted from the 2009 novel of the same name by the Vietnamese-Canadian author Kim Thúy. The film follows the story of a Vietnamese family who fled their country at the end of the Vietnam War and immigrated to Granby, Québec. Like the more than two million other refugees who escaped Vietnam by ships and boats, they became known as "Boat People." The film is told through the eyes of Tinh, the daughter of the family. The scenes jump between her memories in Vietnam, her experiences during the escape, and her family's new life in Canada. Ru depicts the many struggles met by Vietnamese immigrants throughout their journeys and the challenges they faced once they arrived in Canada. Furthermore, the film beautifully portrays the importance of family and community among immigrants like Tinh and her family.

It is fair to say that many students were touched by the film and its characters. "Ru offered a unique perspective on how hard it can be for immigrants to adjust to a new country," said Esther D., a Secondary V student at Royal West Academy. Hannah A., another student, noted "This movie was very moving; it showed how tough and discouraging immigration can be." Tinh's journey allowed the students to experience the many emotions that accompany immigration, her story left a major impact on most of the audience.

Overall, the outing was an unforgettable experience. The actors did an amazing job and the story itself was beautifully told. Given the success of the event, hopefully, Royal West Academy will plan similar trips in the future.

Sortie Cinéma

Le 6 décembre dernier, Mme Moreau, notre enseignante de français, a organisé une sortie au Cinéma Beaubien avec nos classe de français langue maternelle 5e sec. Après avoir survécu à un camp de réfugiés, Tinh est finalement accueillie à Granby, dans les Cantons de l'est. Sa famille d'accueil se révèle très sympathique et gentille et, malgré les défis liés à l'apprentissage d'une nouvelle langue, la famille fait de son mieux pour aider les réfugiés à s'intégrer. Dans l'une des dernières scènes, le personnage principal rassemble toutes les personnes qui ont marqué sa vie et réalise que, malgré un parcours traumatisant, elle peut envisager un avenir dans cette terre étrangère.

Madame Moreau et de nombreux étudiants avaient déjà lu ce livre basé sur la perspective d'une jeune fille dont la vie est bouleversée. Ce film a dépassé nos attentes! Beaucoup ont ressenti une forte connexion visuelle avec l'histoire, comprenant l'expérience de la protagoniste et son arrivée inattendue au Canada. Les décors du film ont enrichi l'expérience, donnant l'impression que l'action se déroulait réellement dans les années 1970. Dans l'ensemble, ce fut une expérience excitante!

Sur une note personnelle, quatre des jeunes filles réfugiées dans le film ont été jouées par nous et nos deux sœurs. Nous étions présentes dans plusieurs des scènes du film, ce qui a surpris nos camarades de classe. "Ru" a été une expérience inoubliable.





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Voices of Olympia Empowers Royal West Academy Students to Combat Poverty

In a display of unity and commitment, Royal West Academy hosted the 6th annual launching ceremony of the Voices of Olympia of Canada (VOOC); this function is only the first step to an ongoing competition for female students. The event aimed to address the pressing issue of poverty faced by women and highlight the innovative ideas put forth by the students to develop feasible solutions to assist women in poverty. The function saw female high school students from nine different schools from Quebec and Ontario with grades ranging from 10 to 11 gathered to express their thoughts, concerns, and potential solutions to combat the feminization of poverty.

RWA students brought to light the root causes of poverty in women and the urgent need for preventive measures to combat deeper topics such as the lack of resources, insufficient opportunity and choices, poor ability to exercise one's human rights, restricted decision-making, and the need of human security that could address poverty at its core

A prevailing topic was to combat the disparities that persist within digital literacy. A skill linked to information, communication, and technology, digital literacy has become indispensable. However, research consistently shows gender inequality in this culture, with women facing numerous barriers to engaging with technology effectively. "We found that a problem that we identified that hasn't been touched upon is the lack of digital literacy among women, and we want to touch on and find solutions to help," said Anaya R, a secondary V student from Royal West Academy.

The Voices of Olympia Competition launch ceremony at Royal West Academy not only provided a platform for students to voice their concerns but also reinforced their belief in the power to create a safer world for women. By openly discussing the barriers faced by women, Students emphasized the power of compassion, to foster a culture of understanding and acceptance within the school community.

By the time the event ended, it was clear that the students at Royal West Academy wanted to see positive changes. Their ambition and hard work showcased their motivation to build a community free of violence against women.
